
POKAGON BAND POTAWATOMI PRESENT KEE-BOON-MEIN-KAA POW WOW

RICHARD "MIKE" DAUGHERTY June 8, 1921 -- February 18, 1994

Mike was not born a Potawatomi Indian. He became a Potawatomi Indian by marrying Rae Williams in 1945 and then learning as much about Potawatomi culture, language and traditions as possible. Mike was later adopted by the Pokagon Band, but more importantly, he adopted the Potawatomi people as his own. He was tireless in his efforts to help the Potawatomi people by passing on the knowledge he had learned about our history, language and culture; by helping to supply black ash splints and handles for the Basket Co-op; by building arbors for any tribal function as needed; by helping to write our future constitution and by doing every thing possible to help achieve Federal Recognition for the Pokagon. Right up to the end he was working for our people, as he and his wife were in Traverse City for a conference that was important to the tribe. One of our greatest regrets in Mike's passing on was that he was not here to see our recognition by the Federal government less than six months later. The Pokagon Band Potawatomi will never forget Mike Daugherty and all his contributions to our Band.

VISITOR ETIQUETTE

Visitors are always welcome to watch public dances. But, it is important for non-Indians to realize that the dances are religious as well as social events and should be observed with respect.

Please, no picture taking during Honor songs. The Flag song to the Indian people is the same as the National Anthem to non-Indians. All people will be asked to stand and remove their hats for all Veterans who have served their people. Should you wish to take pictures of individuals outside the dance arena, ask his or her permission first. Most will be more than happy to accommodate.

The benches inside the arena are for the dancers. The dance portion of this event will last for several hours and the participants will need the use of the benches to refresh themselves.



BLACK ASH BASKETRY

The Potawatomi peoples of Michiana still possess and maintain their ancient skill of basket making. Members gather weekly to make baskets in the old way, for sale and display.

HEAD MALE & JR. MALE DANCERS

The head male dancer for this year is Bob Moody. Bob is a respected dancer of long standing in the Pokagon Band. He and his wife Sheila also raise rabbits at their home in Osceola.

Brian Syrette is the Junior Male Dancer. Brian, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Clarence Syrette of Niles, Michigan, is 12 years old and a 7th grade student at Brandywine School. Brian, who has been dancing for 9 years, is amember of the Wolf Clan of the Ojibway tribe; his traditional name is Red Cloud.





HEAD FEMALE & JR. FEMALE DANCERS

1994's Head Female Dancer is: Corky Sierminski.Corky, a Dowagiac resident, has been doing traditional dance for 12 years. She says she dances to express her heritage. She is also an avid beader and leather craft worker.

Junior Female Dancer for 1994 is: Lisa Swiezkowski. Lisa is 14 years old, and will be a freshman at Laville High School. She and her mother, Patricia Williams, have been dancing for ten years.

VETERAN DANCER

The head Veteran Dancer leads the Grand Entry with the Flag and represents all of the Indian people who gave their lives for our country. He also designates other Flag bearers and officiates feather pick-ups. The Head Veteran Dancer is one of the most important dancers of the Kee-Boon-Mein-Kaa Pow Wow.


The Pokagon Band Potawatomis proudly present the Host Drum for our 1994 Pow Wow: WHITE THUNDER SINGERS



FEDERAL RECOGNITION


Indian people have been locked in a battle for land, self-governance, and spiritual rights since the mass European migration began five hundred years ago. For the past two hundred, the Pokagon Band Potawatomi have been engaged in battles, legal and political as well as physical, for sovereignty for the people of the St. Joseph River Valley.

On August 3, 1994 the U.S. House of Representatives passed Senate Bill 1066, restoring the Pokagon Band to full tribal status in the eyes of the U.S. Government.. This bill will become law upon the imminent signing by President Clinton. This was a great day for the Pokagon Band and also the Little River and Little Traverse Bands which received recognition the same day.

It is our hopes and prayers that this marks the start of the return to power and strength of our people; the power and strength to guide the physical and spiritual well-being of our people, and to oversee the well-being of this land we live on.
