

A COMPACT FOR CHRISTMAS

After more than three years of promises made and broken, near misses and Detroit stalling, four federally recognized tribes received approval from the Michigan Legislature on the compacts negotiated with Governor John Engler in 1995. The Senate granted final approval on the resolution on Friday, December 11, 1998 at about 1:45 a.m. The House had passed it earlier that evening by one vote. The vote followed an intense two weeks of lobbying by the Governor, the leaders of the House and Senate, the Mayor of Detroit and the tribes.


Leaders of the Pokagon Band of Potawatomi Indians, Little Traverse Bay Bands of Odawa Indians, Little River Band of Ottawa Indians and Huron Potawatomi Tribe agreed, in these compacts, to pay 8 percent to the state and have one casino site. An agreement is required by federal law to operate casinos on Indian land.

The payments, of eight percent of gaming revenue generated by slot machines, are made to the Renaissance Fund, formerly known as the Michigan Strategic Fund. The seven tribes currently operating casinos will stop paying their eight percent when the licenses are issued for the Detroit casinos.

The new compacts must still be approved by the U.S. Department of the Interior.

Prior to development, sites must be named and taken into trust. Development and management agreements, if applicable, must be approved by the National Indian Gaming Commission.

"While there is still a lot of work to do," said John Miller, Acting Tribal Chairman, "The approval of the compacts gives us an opportunity to become selfsufficient and take care of our membership."




Representative Gagliardi prepares to start the House Committee hearing where Resolution 115 to approve the compacts is being heard.

The baskets consisted of flour, sugar, ham and potatos, along with a few other items. A special thanks to those who waited patiently for the basket disbursement and to the staff who helped that afternoon.

TRIBAL CHAIRMAN STEPS DOWN

Robert Moody, Jr. (Osceola, IN) resigned as the Pokagon Band Tribal Chairman at Tribal Council Meeting on Tuesday, November 24, 1998. Moody cited job and family obligations as the reason he was unable to complete his term.

Moody, Jr. was elected as Tribal Chair in 1996. He graduated from John Adams High School in 1970 and attended IUSB. Moody has worked for the Westinghouse Electric Corp. for 14 years. He has been involved with many aspects of tribal business for several years. He had served on the Tribal Council, before becoming chairman, for more than 10 years. He was up for re-election in July, 1999.

John Miller is currently acting chairman of the Band.

CHRISTMAS OPEN HOUSE

More than 40 people came through the Administration Offices on Thursday, December 17, 1998. It was the second year for the Open House. It offers a chance for members of the community, who normally don't get a chance to come in, to vist our offices.

The atmosphere was a little more festive with the approval of the gaming compacts. A representative from Senator Harry Gast's office attended. Gast's office was instrumental in gaining the approval through the Senate.

Some members visited the offices and left with some cute little door prizes. We also had visitors from the Huron Band of Potawatomi. The group came following a lunch with the Pokagon elders.

Guests were given a tour of the Administration offices, Education Department and the Social Services Department.

COUNCIL CORNER

The Band is going through a period of turmoil right now. A lot of it can be related to growing pains, but a lot of it goes right back to a lack of Tribal Council reaching out to membership.

Maureen Shagonaby suggested Council members begin putting a note in the Newsletter as a small step in improving communication, and this month it is my turn. Normally I'm not shy about speaking my mind, but I find myself short of ideas for this letter.

The passage of the gaming compact with the state of Michigan is a huge leap for the Band. It clears the major roadblock to the Band's economic development, and with the size of the market in our area, we should have the resources to take care of a long wish list of items for now and the future. My hat's off to all who assisted in the final push of lobbying, whether it was knocking on doors, lending moral support, or covering the business at home so others could lobby. I think all who were in Lansing for the final votes saw just how big an effort it was, from the citizen level to the state Democratic leadership and the Governor.

But the comment that several people made, from all of the new tribes, after the final Senate vote was "Now the real work begins." I think it is this fact that makes it hard for me to write this letter.

Little River Band broke ground on their temporary casino last week, and expect to have it operating by July 4th. Their chairman, Bob Guenthardt, made some interesting comments to the Manistee newspaper. He said that what this economic development would do for Little River was to allow them to set up permanent trust funds to guarantee the education and health care of their Band for the future.

This struck me that the chairman of their tribe is looking that far into the future. There are many immediate needs that we should be attending to, such as expanding health, housing, and elder care, and extending benefits beyond our ten county service area. But Pokagon Band needs to also look to the future and look to guarantee the well-being of the tribe for generations to come.

There is a term out west called a 'checkerboard reservation', where the reservation was whittled away in individual allotments, and the tribes are now going back and trying to fill back in the gaps.

I hope some day our gaming facility is successful enough for per capita payments. But we need to remember what the big prize is: to guarantee the success and future of the whole Band.

Money works just like a magnet: the bigger the magnet the more it draws the little magnets into it. The bigger the lump of money, the more it attracts other money into it.

The longer I serve on Council the more I appreciate the patience of our ancestors to persevere and to give us our own identity that still lives today. I hope that we can carry on that patience, and use this windfall to keep this identity and community alive for generations to come.

POKAGON HEALTH NEWS

BASIC CONTRACT HEALTH SERVICES INFORMATION

For Contract Health Services to make payments on your behalf for your health care services you must:

- 1. Be a Pokagon Band member.
- 2. Live within the Contract Health Service Delivery Area.
- 3. Register for Contract Health Service benefits: This includes providing our office with proof of your insurance(s), or if you have no insurance, you must provide to this office a copy of the denial letter from your local Family Independence Agency. You will be asked to update your file once every 12 months and on an ongoing basis as you make requests.
- 4. Seek prior authorization at least three working days before scheduled health care appointments. You must request CHS coverage before you go to your appointments. Seek separate authorizations for all follow-up appointments, treatment plan follow-up dates, plus any and all labs. CHS cannot pay for health care services without prior authorization.
- 5. Seek authorization within 72 hours of the start of emergency or urgent care. Elders or disabled clients have 30 days to notify our office in case of emergency care.
- 6. Get copies of provider bills to our office. Without the bills, payment cannot be processed.
- 7. IF you have health care insurance(s), you must provide copies of your insurance Explanations of Benefits (EOBS) to our CHS staff. The EOB is the paper from the insurance company which explains what they have paid and the unpaid balance. Without an EOB, payment will not be processed.

CHS payment is limited by medical priorities. Some treatments and procedures are not eligible for payment. We have Contract Health Services staff people available to assist you. Please call with your questions.

What is Building Strong Families?

Building Strong Families (BSF), a Michigan State University program, helps parents and caregivers help children reach their potential in a positive way. It helps parents gain new knowledge and improve their skills so they can be more effective parents.

Using multi-cultural, cartoon style flipcharts and videos, parents develop realistic expectations about normal child development, learn about disciplining effectively, and focus on positive interactions with their children. They also learn how to set realistic personal goals.

The BSF program, which is offered widely throughout Michigan, has been adopted by agencies and organizations in 39 states. It has opened new doors for collaboration within communities and with human service organizations to meet the needs of families.

Building Strong Families has collaborative arrange ments with many probate courts, community foundations, and public and private institutions and agencies.

Is Building Strong Families Effective?

A formal evaluation of the Building Strong Families program was conducted in 1995. Fifty mothers from three counties in Michigan were involved in the study. The counties were Wayne, Ingham and Jackson. The evaluation assessed changes in parent and child interaction through pre and post tests. In addition, parents were asked at the completion of the program about their satisfaction with the program and use of additional community resources. Instructors assessed changes in the safety of the home environment and provided feedback on the use of the Building Strong Families curriculum and materials.

The evaluation found significant changes in parenting behaviors. Parents, after the program, indicated that they were more likely to interact positively with their child in several different areas including the areas of discipline, social, emotional, cognitive and physical wellbeing.

The Housing Department has started a Weatherization Program for all members who live in the 10-county service area. There are no income guidelines and you do not have to own your home. All you have to do is fill out the simple application, and we will send a crew to install plastic on the windows and weather stripping around the doors.

The purpose of the program is to conserve energy and reduce the impact of rising energy costs to members. The elderly, handicapped and households with young children will receive preference first. 

MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS: Preference will be given to an individual of Native American descent. Masters in Public Health (MPH) Health Education from an accredited School of Public Health. At least two years of experience working in Health Education field.

Experience working with communities of color. Good verbal and written communication skills, as well as the ability to work well with people and community organizations are needed. Strong computer skills including word processing, basic graphics creation, data collection and retrieval are required. A valid Michigan Drivers License is required.

Description: This Program Coordinator position will:

- Work directly with the Native American population in the Grand Rapids, Michigan metropolitan area (including the counties of Allegan, Barry, Ionia, Kent, Montcalm, Muskegon and Ottawa) to increase the level of effective intervention for cardiovascular disease and diabetes by early screening and entry into treatment.
- The Program Coordinator will assist the ITC Field Health Director to maintain the "Mmin-nuh-gahdah" (Healthy Heart) Native Health Coalition through written, electronic, and telecommunications and personal contact with the Native Health Coalition members.
- Assure the delivery of heart disease and diabetes screening to 80% of the Native American population in the above mentioned area by the end of year-three of this project than community outreach and education.
- Assure that appropriate inter-agency contracts, agreements, as well as screening protocols are established and renewed or amended as needed.
- Collect data for each individual screening using a computerized health risk appraisal questionnaire.
- Train the Project Health Educator to assist the screening process.
- Coordinate, organize and compile key results from health screenings, demographic and health status reports and studies, and submit such reports to the ITC of Michigan Field Health Director, ITC Epi Center Coordinator and participating Tribes.
- As part of the service administration component of this project, the Program Coordinator will ensure that all health care delivery personnel receive Native American specific cultural competency training including sensitivity and culturally appropriate intervention training.
- Network with local chapters of national organizations (Red Cross, American Heart Association, American Diabetes Association, etc.) to learn about and coordinate access to new programs, materials, and initiatives related to heart disease and diabetes.
- Travel in and around the Grand Rapids, Michigan area (including the counties listed above) and, on occasion, to specific Tribal Sites and the Inter-Tribal Council office is Sault Ste. Marie, MI, is required. Perform other duties as assigned.


