RELEASE OF RED TAIL HAWK

A red tailed hawk released into the wilderness did so with the help of some Pokagon Band members. Tribal Elder Clarence White and Cultural Coordinator John Warren assisted with the release of a red tailed hawk on Thursday, March 25, 1999 at 6:30 p.m. The release took place in a field across the street from the Elders Hall on Townhall Road in Dowagiac. About 40 members watched as the bird took flight. He landed in a tree across the street.

The bird is an immature hawk that was dumped at veterinarian clinic. Because there was no information left with it, it could be released anywhere.

Clarence White conducted a small ceremony before the bird's release. Chuck Mehney, Kalamazoo veterinarian brought the bird to be released. Mehney has been active in the attempt to clean up the Kalamazoo River. The river is contaminated with up to 400,000 lbs. of PCB over an 80-mile stretch. Environmentalists and

scientists are requesting clean-up solutions to preserve the wildlife.

The other option is fining companies who dump waste into the river. However, scientists worry that will not actually solve the problems of cleaning the areas. If they remain contaminated, the wildlife in the area will continue to die.

GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING MAY 8, 1999

> Agenda Topic: Gaming partner selection

The 3rd Annual Midwest Alliance of Sovereign Tribes Impact Week took place in Washington D.C. the week of April 11-15. John Miller and Maureen Shagonaby attended to represent the Pokagon Band. There were 19 tribes from Michigan, Indiana, Wisconsin and Minnesota in attendance.

As always, we are reminded of the great importance of a presence in the national Indian efforts. Sovereignty is a concept the many people struggled to understand. That includes members of Congress. This is a fact that should scare members of any tribe across the country.

In the commerce clause of the Constitution, Indian tribes are recognized as one the three sovereigns. The foreign nations, and the several states, and the Indian tribes are all singled out as sovereigns. That allows for the government to government relationship that tribes enjoy with the United States.

However, Congress has the power to diminish that sovereign, and they have tried during the past few years. While much of the focus is currently on the gaming tribes, it does not lessen the need for our tribe to become involved. We must remain vigilant about issues in Washington D.C.

It also showed the real benefit of having a full time chairman. The government to government relationship is one of the most important aspects of sovereignty. It lends real credibility to any meeting when the chairman is on hand to represent a tribe.

This year M.A.S.T. had a goal to visit Midwestern senators and representatives from states with no reservation tribes. Our attempt was to educate lawmakers briefly on tribal government. It is helpful, because we hope it encourages them to think about Indians as they see anti-Indian legislation come through. The 105th, 106th and 107th Congress have attempted to pass legislation that severely limits sovereignty.

Our representatives were part of a team that won the "Doorknocker Award". This award was given to the group that visited the most members of Congress.

One of the tougher visits was to Congressman Roemer's office. Our relationship with the Congressman has improved. This visit proved just how far we have come. Not only were we warmly welcomed; we spent some time with the Congressman. We did have to answer to the allegations of financial impropriety that appeared in the South Bend Tribune during the past three months. It was a reminder that we are always being watched.

It was a successful trip, and it is our hope the tribe will become more involved with the national issues.

HEALTH NEWS FROM INTER TRIBAL COUNCIL

HEALTHY HEART PROGRAM INITIATES IN GRAND RAPIDS

Diabetes and heart disease are so common that many Native Americans accept them as a fact of life. However, with more and more Native Americans dying from their long-term complications, this attitude must change. The purpose of the Mmin-nuh-gah-dah Healthy Heart Program is to establish early screening for diabetes and heart disease.

My name is Jean Johns, and I am the new Health Educator for the program. I'm an enrolled member of the Keweenaw Bay Tribe of Michigan. I received my

health education degree from Northern Michigan University in 1993 and have worked as a Health Educator in various community health settings. My most recent position was coordinator for the Wisconsin Women's Cancer Control Program.

I have two daughters, Amy and Susan. I also have two grandchildren, Ashley, who is six years old and Michael, who is two years old.

As the Health Educator, my goal is to reduce cardiovascular disease and diabetes by providing early screening and treatment for Native Americans in Allegan, Barry, Ionia, Kent Montcalm, Muskegon and Ottawa counties. Early screening and treatment are important aspects of preventing and treating both diseases. They are prevalent in the Native population.

Aanii, JOHN ALDRED n'dish-nikaaz, the new Health Promotion Disease Prevention Specialist for the Inter-Tribal Council of Michigan, Inc. I am part of the Healthy Heart Program designed to screen Native Americans for diabetes and heart disease. We also refer them to health care services sensitive to cultural traditions of Native Americans, thus making these services user friendly. I intend to teach people about ways to prevent any disease state from happening. It's not just a program about heart disease and diabetes, but about how we, individually, view our surroundings. In future articles, I will address this topic.

I am from the Loonsfoot Clan, residing on the land reserve called Keweenaw Bay Indian Community. I received my formal education and experience from Central Michigan University, majoring in Health & Fitness: Prevention and Rehabilitation. For four years, Mt. Pleasant was my home, as well as the home for CMU and the Saginaw Indian Chippewa Tribe. During my school years, I had the opportunity to meet a variety of interesting and intelligent Anishnabeg. From their teachings, I gained a better perception of reality. I have them to thank for expanding my understanding and vision of the Creator's plan for the universe.

So here I am, with you, in this community, waiting to share my ideals and visions, and to learn and to expand my understanding of life. Chi-migwetch, ahead of time for the teaching you have to offer me. Together, we will learn, we will teach, and we will grow. Baamaapii!

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

The Community Development staff would like to welcome our new Executive Director, Ralene Butler, to the Pokagon Band. She has hit the ground running, not only meeting with people individually, but meeting with each department. One of her goals is to put the departments on track with the strategic planning that is currently being undertaken by the Strategic Action Planning Committee (SAPC). Each department will meet weekly goals and will be developing their long-range plans for programming. This is a positive step forward and seems to be well received. I welcome it.

Corey Price received notice that the Rural Development proposal that he submitted was funded. This will give Housing \$30,000 to do renovation and repairs. Kevin Daugherty has completed the EPA-General Assistance Program proposal that will enable us to hire an Environmental Coordinator to work on the Band's environmental goals. The first year funding will be approximately \$74,514. This is a four-year project and will be funded on a yearly basis for a total of \$300,000.

I submitted two projects on behalf of the Indian Health Service. The Tribal Management Grant, if funded, the \$77,750 will be used to build capacity within the department and to provide policy and procedure manuals for all existing amid. Notification of funding will be in early July. The second year or continuation application for the Diabetes Project was also submitted. The total for the remaining months of this year and for the project year of June, 1999-May, 2000, is \$75,025. Staff will continue to contact each family within the service area for random blood testing to work more closely with members who suffer from diabetes. This is a five-year project.

Tom Morris and the SAPC have done an excellent job on the draft of the mission statement for the Band. They will now convene town hall meetings to get input from the community on the statement and on what the immediate and long-range goals for the Band should be. Once this is accomplished, the entire membership will receive a survey; the results should enable the Committee to accurately identify priorities and to formulate these goals. The completed document will be sent to all tribal members so that you understand what tasks will be undertaken in the next few years.

First Nations Development Institute awarded the Band \$7,500 to provide food baskets to those who have a need. As part of the contract, the Band must match this amount. When the appropriate approvals are given, there will also be an effort made to provide baby formula and baby foods in some of the family baskets. Watch for notices about the project start-up.

HOUSING DEPARTMENT

The Housing Department is Currently taking applications for:

- 1. General membership for low rental units.
- 2. Elders low rental units.
- 3. Home Ownership mutual help
- 4. Emergency Rent payment program.
- 5. Emergency Housing program
- 6. Repairs & Renovation program

The low rental and home ownership applications are being taken at this time to comply with the performance objectives in the one-year plan. This will start our waiting list for eligible members for the different types of housing that will be available. As with all programs that are funded by the Federal Government, there is certain eligibility.

The Emergency Rent program is available to members in the 10-county service area. It is to help mem-

bers with their rent or mortgage payments after all other resources are used up. You must be a member or legal representative of a Pokagon child to receive assistance. You must also be on the rental or mortgage agreement to receive assistance. Single people are not eligible unless (Exception: Elderly or Handicapped may be single). There is other eligibility criteria also.

The Emergency Housing program is for members who are or will be homeless. This program is designed to give the member six months to live in a clean and decent home. Also, you can look for work. That way you can save enough money up so at the end of six months, you can get your own place. There are six trailers for this program and they are set up in Mishawaka, IN. Currently, there are four families living in them. When they are full, we will set up a waiting list.

The Repair and Renovation program is for members who live in the 10-county service area. The member must own their home and provide proof of ownership with a copy of the deed.

For any members who had work done on your home last year and are still waiting for more renovations, you must send in your current household income information. This will be a copy of a W-2 for 1998 or a copy of your 1040 tax return. This is all we need before any work will be done on your home for 1999. This is a compliance issue for BIA, and NAHASDA funds.

If you have any questions, please feel free to call. I can also give you advice on how you might fix something yourself. Or just stop by and talk about what you think might be needed to run this program better. Or just to talk about what ideas you have for the housing projects for the land. I'm always open to ideas.

Boozhoo from the head start program,

Our little ones had a wonderful time during Zisbakdoné-gizes. We were able to learn about the sugaring moon. As always, the children enjoyed singing, dancing and learning with the cultural and language departments. We explored the changes with spring as the Earth renews itself. We tasted Nenteg (maple) sap, syrup, and sugar. We also learned how it was given as a gift to the People.

Which goes something like this: A long time ago, there was an old couple. They had a little boy, which might have been their grandson. Anyway, during that time the Earth was drying up. Water was hard to find and food was getting scarce. People were getting sick. This couple decided to take their boy into the woods and try to find some water and food because he was starting to get weak and sickly. They looked and they looked but they were unable to find anything. The man told his wife that he was getting worried because their boy was getting weaker. The woman replied that she was frightened that he might die. Neither of them was concerned about themselves if they could just find a little something for the boy. The couple were very sad and in despair when a tree spoke to them. The tree told the couple that he had over heard their conversation and was moved by the couple's great love for their child. He told the couple that if they brought the boy near to him, the tree would give the boy something to drink. So, the couple brought their child to the tree. The tree began to seep a liquid; it was liquid nourishment. It leaked sap for the boy to drink. The boy drank and began to get better. 
