#### **LESSONS IN CORN SOUP**

For anyone who thought making corn soup was easy, the lesson given by Mary Church changed that view. On Saturday, November 22, 1997, Mary showed about 20 people the process to make corn soup.

Mary had some prepared. Because the actual preparation takes many, many hours, she used a video of herself preparing the food to show step by step how to do it.

After boiling the corn with ashes to get the hard husks off, she exhibited how to wash the corn and get to the usable portion of the corn.

Many of those in attendance assisted the washing of the corn and got to feel how the texture of the kernels change as the process continues. Once the corn boils in the ashes, the first washing took place outside

with a hose. That gets the initial covering of the ashes off the corn.

The group then took the corn in to wash it in the sink and get the rest of ashes and the husks off the corn.

Mary showed the group how she fixes it with meat, and she also informed them that they could prepare the corn the way they liked it. For some of those watching this process for the first time, it was impressive to see how much work has to go into the preparation of this dish.

## **POKAGON HEALTH SERVICES**

#### **Food Safety**

This is a season for family and community gettogethers. We are fortunate to be able to share festive gatherings with one another. And when we gather we often share meals, feasts, and potlucks. But, feasting together safely requires responsible food preparation and handling.

#### Basic food safety and hygiene:

- Wash your hands before you prepare or serve food, after you go to the toilet, and after you change diapers. (For caregivers: always wash your hands after you assist any individual with their toileting needs.) The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) recommends this method of washing-using both hands and warm soapy water, scrub both sides of both hands, between your fingers and under your nails-CDC says 10 to 15 seconds of this is enough to remove surface germs and soil. Another CDC fun fact- it's the friction and rubbing which does most of the cleaning.
- Wash your food preparation utensils, work areas, serving dishes and serving utensils thoroughly with warm soapy water. Use clean pots, pans, utensils, prop and eating surfaces. Do not cross-contaminate foods with soiled utensils, surfaces, serving dishes, soiled dish towels, or other uncooked foods.
- Wash your fruits and vegetables thoroughly before eating or preparing. (Or, peel and wash.)
- Cook foods thoroughly. For your safety, if it is not a dish made completely of vegetables or fruit, you need to cook it completely.
- Keep hot foods hot, cold foods cold, and refrigerate leftovers promptly-

#### Flu shots

So far this flu season, the Pokagon Band nursing staff has provided approximately 150 flu shots for Tribal members and their households. We will continue to offer this service throughout the month of December. You can make an appointment for a flu shot by calling our office at (616)782-4141 or by dialing (888) 440-1234. Excluding holidays, Nursing staff is available at our Dowagiac office Mondays through Fri-

days, and at Sister Lakes Medical Center Tuesday mornings and Thursday afternoons. In the interest of maximizing our community's health, this service is offered free of charge.

#### **PBPIHS Contract Health Services**

The contract Health Service program has been running for 15 months, since August, 1996. In that time, 600 Pokagon Band members have used this service at least one time, and we have purchased services from 200 area doctors, dentists, pharmacists. hospitals and clinics

Because of program guidelines, because the program is as busy as it is and because we have passed the one year mark we need to update our patient registration files. Our Policy is to update client information files every 12 months. You will be asked to answer questions about your insurance status, address and other important details at least once a year so we can keep our information current. Beginning in January, 1998, you will need to present two proofs of residence in order to be entered into the Patient Registration System.

To be eligible for C.H.S. you must:

- · Be an enrolled Pokagon Band member.
- Live within the Contract Health Service Delivery Area
- Be entered in the Patient Registration System.
- Receive prior authorization for each health care appointment when you wish to access CHS benefits.

During the week of December 8th, some members of Health Services staff and Health Board members will be in Manistee along with health service and community planning staff from Little Traverse Bay Bands, Little River Band and the Huron Band of Potawatomi for technical assistance in health planning. We will seek sustainable solutions to delivering health services to our populations.

We are in the final stages of completing our Substance Abuse Task Force ordinance. When it is presented to Tribal Council in December, we would like to submit names of those members interested in serving on the Task Force. We need your ideas! At the present time, our Intensive Outpatient Program is thriving. Recently, a member reported that he/she had been looking for something like this and did not realize the Band provided such a service. Since this has been an available program since September, 1996, I was surprised! Our Intensive Outpatient Program is a group that meets twice a week for two hours each session. The focus of the group is to understand addiction, how it plays out in one's life, and how to overcome it. We talk about triggers that push us toward use, relapse and how to prevent it. The group is fun; no one says that recovery work is humorless. All we ask for is the sincere desire to learn alternative ways of coping with use of alcohol and other drugs. If you are interested in joining us, please call Jeffrey.

The Tuesday morning Mother and Daughter bead group has been meeting regularly for the past two months. We share lots of laughter as well as beading techniques. Bring your supplies and join us; Tuesdays from 8:30 - 10:30 a.m. If you don't have supplies, you may purchase some here for a very nominal amount; we all share also!

Wednesday evening from 5:00-7:00 p.m. young male Band members meet to bead and have fun. Our group is growing. We usually provide both snacks and supplies. 

## POKAGON HUMAN SERVICES

Repairs and Renovation Program

The program has gone very well during the last year. There has been so much that has been done for the members, especially the Elders in the first few months that we got started. The program started last October, and we were accommodating just elders sixty and over. This past April we opened the program up to all band members. There has been a big demand for work to be done, and my budget was to last until next September. Well, the budget has been so well utilized, the money that is left will be used for members who have emergency needs, (like your furnace quits, your roof is leaking bad, your windows are broken out, your water quits or you have no hot water, etc.

I want to make clear who qualifies for the Repair and Renovation programs currently in existence. You must be an enrolled Pokagon Band member. You must live in the ten county service area and these are: Allegan, Berrien, Cass and Van Buren Counties in Michigan and Elkhart, Kosciusko, LaPorte, Marshall, Starke and St. Joseph Counties in Indiana. If you don't live in any of those listed, then you can't receive help. You must own your home. We cannot and will not do work that the landlord should repair or renovate on rental or lease homes. These requirements are for the HIP assistance program, the down payment assistance program and the sanitation program.

#### THE GREAT FLOOD

One very remarkable character reported in our legends, dimly seen through the mist of untold centuries, is Kwi-wi-sens Nenaw-bo-zhoo, meaning in Algonquin dialect, "The greatest clown-boy in the world." When he became a man, he was not only a great prophet among his people, but a giant of such marvelous strength that he could wield his war-club with force enough to shatter in pieces the largest pine tree. His hunting-dog was a monstrous black wolf, as large as a full-grown buffalo, with long, soft hair, and eyes that shone in the night like the moon. The deity of the sea saw the charming beauty of this wolf-dog and was so extremely jealous of him, that he was determined to take his life. So he appeared before him in the form of a deer; and as the dog rushed to seize him, he was grasped by the deity and drowned in the depths of the sea. He then made a great barbecue and invited as his guests whales, serpents, and all the monsters of the deep, that they might exult and rejoice with him that he had slain the dog of the prophet.

When the seer-clown learned of the fate of his dog, through cunning Waw-goosh (the fox), whose keen eyes saw the deception that cost the wolf-dog his life, he sought to take revenge upon the sea-god. So he went at once to the place where the latter was accustomed to come on land with his monster servants to bathe in the sunshine, and there he concealed himself among the tall rushes until the "caravan of the deep" came ashore. When they had fallen asleep, he drew his giant bow, twice as long as he was tall, and shot a poisoned arrow that pierced Neben Manito, the water-god, through the heart. Neben Manito rolled into the sea, and cried, "Revenge! Revenge!" Then all the assembled monsters of the deep rushed headlong after the slayer of their king. The prophet fled in consternation before the outraged creatures that hurled after him mountains of water, which swept down the forests like grass before the whirlwind. He continued to flee before the raging flood, but could find no dry land. In sore despair he then called upon the God of Heaven to save him, when then appeared before him a great canoe, in which were pairs of all kinds of land-beast and birds, being rowed by a most beautiful maiden, who let down a rope and drew him up into the

The flood raged on; but, though mountains of water were continually being hurled after the prophet, he was safe. When he floated on the water for many days, he ordered Aw-milk (the beaver) to dive down

and, if he could reach the bottom, to bring up some earth. Down the latter plunged, but in a few minutes came floating to the surface lifeless. The prophet pulled him into the boat, blew into his mouth, and he became alive again. He then said to Waw-jashk The musk-rat), "You are the best diver among all the animal creation. Go down to the bottom and bring me up some earth, out of which I will create a new world; for we cannot much longer live on the face of the deep."

Down plunged the musk-rat; but, like the beaver, he too, soon came to the surface lifeless, and was drawn into the boat, where upon the prophet blew into his mouth, and he became alive again. In his paw, however, was found a small quantity of earth, which the prophet rolled into a small ball, and tied to the neck of Ka-ke-gi (the raven), saying, "Go thou and fly to and fro over the surface of the deep, that dry land may appear." The raven did so; the waters rolled away; the world resumed its former shape; and, in the course of time, the maiden and prophet were united and re-peopled the world.

POKAGON BAND OF POTAWATOMI INDIANS ELDERS COUNCIL BUSINESS MEETING

NOVEMBER 6, 1997 - 11:00 A.M.

The meeting was called to order by Gerald Wesaw at 11:10 A.M. The invocation was given by Clarence White.

#### Roll Call

Present: Gerald Wesaw, Marge Moody, Clarence White, Mary Jo Morris, Rachel Daugherty Absent: Mary Church-excused Attendance: 24 Elders + 5 Guests

Fred Klemm moved to approve the minutes of Sept.4, 1997. Rae Daugherty seconded the motion. All in favor, opposed 0.

Fred Klemm moved to approve the minutes of October 2, 1997. Marge Moody seconded the motion. All in favor, opposed 0.

Social luncheon report - October 16, 1997. Jodi Palmer, our Education Director had a grant request for a service learning project for the Elders. Students aged 10-15 would help with yard work at Elders homes. Jodi asked for a letter of support which was signed by Gerald Wesaw and Marge Moody. Jodi introduced two new Youth Coordinators: Marie Wesaw and Donald Sumners

Also: Joe Winchester passed out his October MIEA report, the MIEA agenda and their mission statement.

Communications - The grant Jodi Palmer presented to Elders Council & Membership on October 16th didn't go through. Jo Ellen will be doing research for another grant.

Nominations - MIEA Committee - Joe Winchester nominated John Wesaw, Jr.; John Wesaw, Jr. nominated Sam Wesaw; Marge Moody nominated Rae Daugherty. Gerald asked if there were any other nominations. There were none. Gerald closed the nominations.

Rae Daugherty, Sam Wesaw, and John Wesaw, Jr. all accepted. Voting was done by a show of hands. John Wesaw, Jr. - 16 votes, Sam Wesaw - 9 votes, Rae Daugherty - 10 votes. John Wesaw, Jr. and Rae Daugherty will be on the MIEA Committee,

Mike Wesaw read our audit report dated June 4. 1997. Our next audit will be late December or early January. Crowe/Chizek, our audit firm is one of the top 10 firms in the country. The fiscal year is September 30, 1997. Total stipends \$107,475.00. Renovation & Repair \$216,246.85. Area Aging \$81,817.60. Administrative \$40,520.28. Total Elders program is \$446,059.73. This is funded by a variety of grants, federal funding and internal funding on behalf of the Elders. Discussions were on Elders stipend, Harrah's contract, bingo, economic development, HUD and BIA funding. Also discussed was a monthly discretionary dollar amount Elders Council would be responsible for in the way it is spent.

Funeral dinners at Sacred Heart Church Hall - no action was taken.

January, February, March meetings - Membership agreed to have one meeting a month for these months. First Thursday of each month; weather permitting, MIEA Committee will meet if something needs to be done.

50/50 volunteers - November - Clarence & Marge are luncheon volunteers - December - Rae & Marge 50/ 50 volunteers - December - Harry & Ann, Tom & Bonnie

Marge is going to check further on a casino trip. Possible dates are December 10th or 15th.

Thanksgiving luncheon is Thursday, November 20<sup>th</sup>. Staff is invited, and it will be potluck. The meat will be donated by three Elders.

Becky Price, R.N.C. passed out some forms for membership to fill out for an Injury Prevention grant.

#### **MAKING A DIFFERENCE**

The local Chapter of Squaw, Incorporated as part of the national organization is changing its name. The move is in response to the controversial nature and the questionable connotation of the word "squaw" as well as the ethic negativity it created for some. The change comes after five years of discussion and re-examination of their values.

Pokagon Band Councilmember Julie Stauffer worked with the members of the B.H. chapter as they changed their name. Stauffer pointed out the inappropriateness of this name and the derogatory meaning the word has for Native women.

Stauffer also helped with an education process to get the name changed. That process included letters of support sent by Native American activists Wilma Mankiller, Richard Morales, Suzanne Harjo to the Squaw chapters located near their reservations or agencies.

The history of the former Squaws chapters began with the Pittsburgh founding chapter. Philadelphia became the first chapter under incorporation in 1964. The Benton Harbor Chapter of Squaws, Inc. was chartered in June, 1970. These community-minded women were young housewives who wanted to support their community and to help to others. It now represents women from all walks of life.

Since this chapter began, it has donated time and money to numerous programs. Among those are the Benton Harbor Senior Citizen's Center, the Charles Gray Teen Center, School Age Mothers program of the Benton Harbor Area Schools, Sickle Cell Anemia, and many other programs.

During the 15th Biennial Conclave July, 1996, the decision to change this civic-social organization was completed. Since its incorporation, a silver charm has been given by each hosting chapter to each Squaw as a symbol of true sisterhood, harmony and unity. Bracelets jingling with silver medallions enhance the wrists of these ladies at every conclave and board meeting. It was decided "Silver Charms" or "Charms" would be an appropriate name.

Once the research was completed by our legal representative, the "Charms" was the final choice. During the Biennial Executive Board meeting in Savannah this past July all documentation, symbols, etc. was changed to reflect Charms, Inc.

The Benton Harbor Charms will continue to serve this area with as much devotion, fervor and energy as before.


