


The office is roomy enough to hold many of the support meetings.

#### Gaming Update-

#### Michigan

Our sources are saying that both sides in the legislature are closer to compromise language surrounding Proposal E than what is being portrayed in the media. Both the Democratic and Republican party leaders are desirous of resolving this language before the legislature breaks for the summer. Word has it that the speaker of the house has committed to introducing our compacting immediately after Proposal E legislation is passed. Additionally, the governor has asked his leadership when our compacts are going to get approved. We should be anticipating approval of our compact prior to the July 4 holiday. This seems to be good cause for optimism, but unfortunately there are no guarantees in politics.

The Tribal Council has authorized Bob Moody to send a letter to Secretary Babbitt, asking him to intervene on our behalf. The intervention requested is either through prescribing a compact or the more expedient litigation process. It appears the Interior Department is leaning toward litigation against the states. The states being considered are Michigan and Alabama.

#### Indiana

We are proceeding with our education process of the general public on the issues surrounding Indian gaming and our rights in particular. A couple of study committees have been established, and we will become intimately involved with both. We will not repeat the debacle from Elkhart where we had no real input into the process. A town hall meeting will have been completed by the time this newsletter is issued. The goal was to present the positive issues surrounding gaming. Maureen has compiled an impressive list of speakers on our behalf.

As of yet, no site has been determined. The ultimate location for our casino may be dependent upon the final outcome of the Memorandum of Understanding on land in trust issues that we are waiting anxiously for from the Interior Department.

# **BUILDING STRONG FAMILIES**

The BSF program, which is offered widely throughout Michigan, has been adopted by agencies and in 39 states. It has opened new doors for collaboration within communities and with human service organizations to meet the needs of families

Building Strong Families has collaborative arrangements with many probate courts, community foundations, and public and private institutions and agen-

A formal evaluation of the Building Strong Families was conducted in 1995. Fifty mothers from three counties in Michigan were involved in the study. The counties were Wayne, Ingham and Jackson. The evaluation assessed changes in parent and child interaction through pre and post tests. In addition, parents were asked at the completion of the realistic expectations about program about their satisfaction with the program and use of additional community resources. Instructors assessed changes in the safety of the home environment and provided feedback on the use of the Building Strong Families curriculum and materials.

The evaluation found significant changes in parenting behaviors. Parents, after the program, indicated that they were more likely to interact positively with their child in several different areas including the areas of discipline, social, emotional, cognitive and physical well being.

#### WHAT IS BUILDING STRONG FAMILIES?

Building Strong Families (BSF), a Michigan State University program, helps parents and caregivers help children reach their potential in a positive way. It helps parents gain new knowledge and improve their skills so they can be more effective parents.

Using multi-cultural cartoon style flipcharts and videos, parents develop realistic expectations about normal child development, learn how to discipline effectively, and focus on positive interactions with their children. They also learn how to set realistic personal goals.

The Pokagon Band Social Services has a New program "Building Strong Families". This program is designed for children age 0-3 yrs.

We believe that being a parent is one of the toughest jobs you will ever have. It is demanding and can be stressful. By learning more about your child's development, you can gain confidence in your ability to guide and care for your child.

Last May, the seven member Pokagon Band Health Board was established to help shape policies to ensure ethical and equitable health service delivery to eligible clients of the Pokagon Band Health Services programs. Board members have been meeting regularly once and twice a month since May, 1996.

Two Health Board member seats become vacant at the end of May, 1997. These are the seats of Mark Topash, Chairperson, and Loretta Yount, Treasurer. Waa waa nah to Mark and Rita for your service throughout this first year.

We are seeking community members to assume these vacant positions. #### Contract Health Services (CHS)

Contract Health Service is neither an insurance nor an entitlement program. Because of budget limitations and Federal guidelines eligibility criteria must be met. To be eligible for Contract Health Services you must:

- 1. Be an enrolled member of the Pokagon Band.
- 2. Live within the ten-county Contract Health Service Delivery Area (Allegan, Berrien, Cass, and Van Buren Counties in Michigan and Elkhart, Kosciusko, LaPorte, Marshall, Starke and St. Joseph Counties in Indiana).
- 3. Have Contract Health Service prior authorization through Pokagon Band Contract Health Service personnel for any and all medically related services.

Some exceptions and limitations exist to this outline. Call Lois Wesaw, CHS Benefits Specialist at (616) 782-4141 or 1-888-440-1234 for more information and/or to request CHS coverage.

#### **ELECTION COMMITTEE**

The Election Committee met on Friday, May 16, 1997 at the Elders Hall. Declaration forms were sent on May 13, 1997, for the following council seats: Secretary, Treasurer, and three members at large.

The following is information that is important to the candidates and to the voters.

# DECLARATION FOR CANDIDACY FOR TRIBAL COUNCIL:

In order to be a candidate for Tribal Council, a person:

Must be an enrolled member of the Pokagon Band Must be at least 25 years of age on or before the date of the election.

Must declare candidacy for election on the official Declaration Form no later than May 28, 1997. Candidates must include their full name, address and signature.

Candidates may declare for one seat only. A candidate for Councilperson is eligible for any one of the open Councilperson positions.

Candidates must send their Declaration forms to the post office box designated on the Declaration form. Write-in votes on the ballot shall not be counted.

#### **POLLING PLACES--WHERE TO VOTE:**

Voters with addresses in Indiana shall vote at the Indiana Historical Society located at 808 W. Washington St., South Bend, Indiana.

Voters with a Michigan address shall vote at Elders Hall. Voters living outside of Michigan or Indiana shall vote at the Elders Hall polling place in Dowagiac, Michigan.

Any waiver of this provision must be received in the mail by the Election Committee ten calendar days before the date of the election.

#### **POLLING PLACE TIMES:**

Michigan

Polling times shall be from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Michigan time (Eastern time) on July 12.

Polling times shall be from 7:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. Indiana time (Central time) on July 12.


Gerald asked membership how often they wanted the white elephant auction. It was decided the white elephant auction will be in June, August, October during our social luncheon; the second Thursday of the month.




