POKAGON CAMP '97

The Pokagon Band's Second Annual Leadership Camp wrapped up a busy week with a pow wow to show off the kids hard work.

The kids, ages 8-18, spent the week making regalia and learning to dance. The group also spent sessions learning the Potawatomi language.

The first day the kids arrived was Sunday, and they had a cook-out to get to know each other. Each day the kids got up at 5 a.m. for the sunrise ceremonies.

In the morning the boys and girls split up for some spiritual teachings.

The language classes kept them busy for a few hours, and preparing for the pow wow was also part of their schedule. There were also tribal members helping the kids with the sewing and preparations for Friday's finale.

On Wednesday, the campers swam and later held

a skit night. The counselors and their group of kids had to come up with a skit or song to entertain their peers.

Each skit was unique, ranging from drama to comedy. In one, the king kept requesting his royal paper from his subjects. Each subject would take the wrong paper. First, the king got a newspaper, and that was not right. The next servant took some business papers, and that was not right. Finally a servant got it right when he took toilet paper to the king.

The Friday pow wow was also a success. The campers chose their head junior female and male dancers. The kids showed off their new regalia during the dancing.

White Thunder and Silver Creek Singers provided the drumming and singing for the dancers. Another popular moment was the ladies choice for the two-step. The tired kids left camp on Saturday after a busy and eventful week.

POLLING PLACES--WHERE TO VOTE:

Voters with addresses in Indiana shall vote at the Indiana Historical Society located at 808 W. Washington St., South Bend, Indiana. Voters with a Michigan address shall vote at Elders Hall. Voters living outside of Michigan or Indiana shall vote at the Elders Hall polling place in Dowagiac, Michigan.

Any waiver of this provision must be received in the mail by the Election Committee ten calendar days before the date of the election.

Michigan

Polling times shall be from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Michigan time (Eastern time) on July 12. Indiana

Polling times shall be from 7:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m. Indiana time (Central time) on July 12.

There was a time when we had difficulties in paying the heating bills and making all ends meet. I also remember a time when it was hard to meet the Elders needs. Unless you had individual health coverage, medical needs were either put off, or simply not met. We have grown considerably since those times. We are now farther along in providing membership services for our people than any of the other three newly recognized tribes. That is a major accomplishment made possible by the efforts of Tribal Council, Tribal Directors, and Tribal Staff.

We are a democratic society able to make decisions that will impact our future. Our future right now is the decision-making ability of the leadership of the Band. You the membership have a responsibility to ensure that the Tribal Council includes the most qualified group of Pokagon individuals. In essence it is you the membership that has the right to determine our future. On Saturday, Ju1y 12, 1997, please make good use of your right and privilege to vote. Voting for family members, or for the popular name may seem like the easy way to exercise your rights. I assure you the best candidates will only emerge if we the members take the time to know ALL the candidates, their intent, and their specific qualifications.

Remember that we are not only responsible for the welfare of this generation, but more importantly charged with the accountability to provide for generations to come.

LEGISLATIVE REPORT

First, let me apologize for missing the last two newsletters. There has been very little action in the Michigan Legislature on which to report. I will make every attempt to have an article, informational or not, in future newsletters.

Rhetoric is rampant in the halls of Michigan's Capitol. It was reported in the last newsletter there may be action on the Compact on June 14, 1997. I read this as rhetoric from Lansing to give us the appearance there is real discussion going on regarding our Compact. In my opinion, we are still being victimized by politics of both parties.

The discussions which are currently taking place have little to do with the approval of our Compact. There has been minimal compromise on Proposal E between the political parties, and now the transportation package (road repair) has been thrown in for debate.

I spoke with Representative Gagliardi's Chief of Staff on Mackinaw Island last week to get an idea of how things were shaking out. His answers were not very promising, but he suggested the potential for agreement prior to the summer recess was always possible. I might add, there is no date set yet for summer break, and it may be a long, hot summer. The issue of road repair has become an important chip in the game. The Governor wants his road package approved, but that will be impossible without Democratic support. Hence, more negotiation.

Although the dialogue is meant to give the appearance of action, it is my opinion there may be an ulterior motive in the whole process. The Republicans have been very slow to move and have remained unwilling to acknowledge the will of the voters.

The House has debated and voted on several gaming bills. There has been about 15 introduced in the last three weeks. The bills of substance require 3/4 vote of the House for passage. The only bills to pass at this point have minimal impact on gaming in Michigan. A stalemate is a strong possibility in the House.

The Senate, which took the week of June 16th off, (no work to do) is scheduled to begin debate on roughly 20 pieces of legislation introduced by members of the Casino and Oversight Committee. I don't expect much in the way of significant legislation coming from the Senate either. It will take 3/4 vote to pass

any bills from the Senate to go to the House for review.

While all this is happening in Lansing, Detroit is drafting their own rules and regulations on how the licenses will be issued. Detroit is having their own political concerns and disagreements over the preference and location issues. The Detroit legislative contingent has also exercised its clout in Lansing.

While all this debate and negotiation is going on, there are two groups attempting to place on the ballot during the next general election, (1998) a referendum to outlaw casino gaming in Michigan. I believe if the referendum makes the ballot, there is strong likelihood it may pass. As you recall, Proposal E was approved by a narrow margin. The anti-casino group didn't finance much of a fight because they didn't believe the public would support non-Indian casinos in Michigan.

The bottom line is we need the Secretary of the Interior to step up to the plate and support Native Americans in the Compacting process. It is important they begin the legal battle on behalf of Native Americans who are being thwarted by the States in the Compacting process. If the Secretary of Interior would have commenced the ground work for litigation 18 months ago, we might not be in the position we find ourselves now. Forget politics, do the right thing.

On a closing note, I hope the membership participates in the next Tribal election. Exercise your right to vote, and check on the values each candidate exhibits. Remember, they will be representing YOU!

SUBSTANCE ABUSE

Substance Abuse Services to Formalize a Substance Abuse Advisory Committee

A Substance Abuse Advisory Committee is being formalized. The committee is to be made up of seven Tribal Council-appointed representatives of the Pokagon Band eligible service population. In addition, two ex-officio members will be retained. As an extension of Council, the purpose of the committee is to review and comment on existing and developing substance abuse program policy and procedures, to advise the substance abuse director on pertinent matters, and to advocate on behalf of the program, clients and the community. The term of office shall be for three years and staggered.

Interested community members are being sought for appointment to the Substance Abuse Advisory Committee. BUILDING STRONG FAMILIES

The BSF program, which is offered widely throughout Michigan, has been adopted by agencies and in 39 states. It has opened new doors for collaboration within communities and with human service organizations to meet the needs of families.

Building Strong Families has collaborative arrangements with many probate courts, community foundations, and public and private institutions and agencies.

A formal evaluation of the Building Strong Families was conducted in 1995. Fifty mothers from three counties in Michigan were involved in the study. The counties were Wayne, Ingham and Jackson. The evaluation assessed changes in parent and child interaction through pre and post tests. In addition, parents were asked at the completion of the realistic expectations about program about their satisfaction with the program and use of additional community resources. Instructors assessed changes in the safety of the home environment and provided feedback on the use of the Building Strong Families curriculum and materials.

The evaluation found significant changes in parenting behaviors. Parents, after the program, indicated that they were more likely to interact positively with their child in several different areas including the areas of discipline, social, emotional, cognitive and physical well being.

WHAT IS BUILDING STRONG FAMILIES?

Building Strong Families (BSF), a Michigan State University program, helps parents and caregivers help children reach their potential in a positive way. It helps parents gain new knowledge and improve their skills so they can be more effective parents.

Using multi-cultural cartoon style flipcharts and videos, parents develop realistic expectations about normal child development, learn how to discipline effectively, and focus on positive interactions with their children. They also learn how to set realistic personal goals.

The Pokagon Band Social Services has a New program "Building Strong Families". This program is designed for children age 0-3 yrs.

We believe that being a parent is one of the toughest jobs you will ever have. It is demanding and can be stressful. By learning more about your child's development, you can gain confidence in your ability to guide and care for your child.

Pokagon Band Housing Authority, <u>Treasurer</u>. Working to build 14+ Elder Housing Units.



ENROLLMENT OFFICE



Thank you Trish Williams for the goose story that appeared in the March newsletter. We do well to take heed to nature's object lessons. It is a way of learning. It is a good way. In my 76 years of observation, I have found it so.

I, too have marveled over the precision flights of wild geese. The leader seldom looks back as he leads the flock.

The clarion call is given, "do you follow?" The flocks answer, "we follow."

The flock is comprised of the mature, the young, and the weak. The leader never flys faster than the weakest, but with just enough incentive to keep them from straggling. None must fall by the way-side!

The leader being of flesh, blood and bone is subject to fatigue. Weary, he falls back in formation but never out of the flocks. A fresh leader moves to the front. This is done time after time until they reach their intended destination. This is leadership or eldership at its best. His voice will be heard again---the voice of experience.

Geese mate for life, thus making a strong family bond. By wise design, the Creator has made parent birds flightless in mid-summer insuring that the young will not be abandoned by a whim of the parent.

The Creator has programmed the little ones while still in the egg. They come with a built-in clock and a compose for migration. When count-down of the "equinox" is reached, there is a lift-off. They are on their way!

When the earth is barely visible because of dense fog, geese abandon the "V" formation in favor of a long drawn out "U". Sometimes a long line of flight because it is easier for more eyes to search through the fog and probe the unknown.

Yesterdays pampered young will return. They will mate, nest and raise their young, adding to the flock.
