MIKE WESAW GETS ROASTED

It was said the Indians gave up their land for a few trinkets and \$24. Well, maybe to get a casino in South Bend, Mike Wesaw and the Pokagons should offer the mayor a few trinkets and \$24. That was just one of the lines Roastmaster Pat Catanzarite tossed at Finance Director Mike Wesaw during the 48th Annual South Bend Press Club Gridiron Dinner and Hoaxes.

Some of Indiana's biggest newsmakers got roasted including Governor Frank O'Bannon, Lt. Governor Joe Kernan, Congressman Tim Roemer, South Bend Mayor Steve Luecke and Notre Dame head coach Bob Davie, along with several others.

For Mike, the challenge was to sit and not say anything while the roasting went on and on and on and on.

One of the biggest topics of discussion was the College Football Hall of Fame and the financial burden

it has become for tax problems. The roastmaster suggested that Mike and the Pokagons talk to the city about buying the Hall of Fame and putting the casino there.

The Hall of Fame provided the best line of the evening directed at former South Bend Mayor Joe Kernan who is now the Lieutenant Governor. Catanzarite said there may be another use for the hall. It could become the only homeless shelter with a spiral staircase in it.

The roast also included some videos and musicals by politicians and performers. There were six members of the Pokagon Band Indiana negotiating team in attendance at the event held at Notre Dame's Joyce Center.

For the past few weeks, I have been busy learning about the current educational programs and determining the near future priorities for the department. Unfortunately, I have also had to inform tribal members that some misinformation about presently nonexistent programs has been distributed. I am very sorry that it has happened, and I hope you will understand I have not eliminated programs. The programs never really existed. I plan to expand our educational services but we first need to focus on successfully implementing the programs that are already in place.

The Education Department is co-sponsoring the Spring Gathering at Rush Lake on May 14-17. I hope many of you will be able to take time to listen to the teachings. Our future strength is gained through knowledge. As the Original People, we have a responsibility to make the circle complete, not only for ourselves but for our future generations. Substance Abuse News

We are finally located and fully staffed at 714 N. Front Street! Our newest staff member is Jeffrey Genereaux, our secretary/receptionist, who is busy trying to organize our office. Bonnie White, our Intervention/Prevention Specialist, is currently facilitating two groups; an Intensive Outpatient Program twice a week in Hartford and a Hazards of Smoking Clinic here on Saturday mornings.

Our first Intensive Outpatient Program was successfully completed at the end of March. The graduates have moved on to a Stage 11 Recovery Group. Instead of meeting twice a week, they meet on Tuesday evenings for two hours. Beginning in May this group will meet on Monday evenings. The format of the Stage 11 Recovery Group allows more variety. In addition to learning living skills, group members have experienced a Talking Circle led by Don Sumners, a Pipe Ceremony led by Sam Bush, and Shield Teachings led by John Morseau. We would all like to express our warmest thanks to you for sharing with us.


We are now ready to begin another evening Intensive Outpatient Program here at the center. If any one is interested, or needs to come to satisfy probation requirements, please call Jeffrey to register. We continue to offer a Codependency Group on Tuesday evenings, Alateen on Thursday evenings and sponsor an AA meeting on Wednesday evenings at the Sacred Heart Church. We also provide Adolescent Aftercare on a weekly basis. Trish Williams facilitates a Woman's Group on Thursday afternoons here at the center.

As always, we offer assessments and referral for either inpatient or outpatient treatment and also evaluations for driver's license reinstatement. Please call and ask Jeffrey to schedule an appointment.

Our *new offerings* will include an Open House on Wednesday, May 21 from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.(Michigan time). Come in and visit us! Jeffery, Bonnie and I will be there to answer questions about our present and future programs. Beginning in May there will be some day/time changes. The Stage 11 Recovery Group will meet on Monday evenings. The

Codependency Group will continue on Tuesday evenings but will meet from 7:00 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. On Wednesday evenings from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. a support group for parents of teens will be held. Following the support group, a new Men's Anger Management Group will be held from 8:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. If you are interested in any of these groups, please call us at (616) 782-1142.

Social Services

The staff in Social Services has been trained in the "Building Strong Families" and is ready to begin implementing the program designed for families with children aged 0-3 years. "Building Strong Families" teaches how babies and toddlers grow, how to play with children, how to positively discipline children and how to feel good about yourself. The outreach workers are prepared to go to individual homes to teach these skills. Letters of introduction have been sent to families with children in this age group. Anyone interested in becoming a part of this program, please call Don Sumners at 1-800-517-0777.

Applications for energy assistance and the emergency fund are now located in the Social Services Department. There is very limited funding available for Band members needing emergency energy assistance. If you have questions, or need to fill out an application, please call Don.

As part of the Family Preservation grant, the Social Services department has developed brochures outlining the services currently provided by the Band. These brochures have been available in all Band departments. If you have not received one, please ask at Commodities, I.H.S., Social Services, Education, or Substance Abuse. We are now sending these brochures to agencies within the Pokagon Band's service delivery area in order to facilitate agency referral to our services. This grant will also provide training to the outreach workers in parenting skills for parents of children from ages 4-12 years. Band members will now have the opportunity to learn parenting skills for older children.

Pokagon Band member, Susan Beavers was hired as the newest Pokagon Band CHR. She has worked in local health agencies for a number of years in outreach and health aide positions. Susan is already on the road serving client needs. I have heard good reports about her pleasant, competent manner. Welcome, Susan.

Contract Health Services (CHS)

CHS is not an insurance program, nor is it an entitlement program, but CHS can be used to pay for some Pokagon Band member health care services. Eligible members must meet certain requirements to access this Service. To be eligible, a person must be an enrolled member of the Pokagon Band, live within the Contract Health Service Delivery Area (Allegan, Berrien, Cass, and Van Buren Counties in Michigan and Elkhart,

Kosciusko, LaPorte, Marshall, Starke, and St. Joseph Counties in Indiana), and receive prior authorization for CHS each and every time for each and every health care appointment and service to which CHS program dollars are to be used.

At our Front Street office we have some medical equipment available to loan. If you or a family member needs temporary or longer term use of crutches, canes, walkers, tub chairs, tub rails, etc., give our office a call. We may have the item on hand to loan.


ELECTION COMMITTEE



This is the first of three annual sessions designed to develop new speakers and teachers of the Potawatomi Language. This year, the Scholars' College will be held at the Hannahville Indian Community, in the Upper Peninsula. The dates are June 9-20, and July 28-August 8, 1997.

Scholarships covering travel, room, board and per diem are available for two participants from the Pokagon Band. Any other Band members are encouraged and welcomed to attend, but must pay their own expenses.

THE POKAGON BAND HOME IMPROVEMENT **EXPANDS SERVICE**



The Home Improvement Program has been opened up to all Pokagon Band members who live in our Ten county service area. The Eligibility Requirements Have Five factors: Annual Income, family size, overcrowded living conditions, age, and handicap or disability. These factors are scored on a pointing system, and the applicant with the most points will be served first etc. Applicants whose annual income exceeds the Department of Health and Human Services Poverty Income Guidelines by 225% or more shall be ineligible for HIP Assistance on basis of need. The start-up date is May 1, 1997. So if you wish to apply for the HIP, send requests for an application to P.O. BOX 180 Dowagiac, MI 49047 and I will mail one to you. NEWS FROM THE ELDERS

POKAGON BAND OF POTAWATOMI INDIANS ELDERS COUNCIL BUSINESS MEETING APRIL 3, 1997

The meeting was called to order by Gerald Wesaw at 11:10 AM. The invocation was given by Clarence White.

Roll Call

Present: Gerald Wesaw, Mary Jo Morris,

Clarence White, Mary Church, Rae

Daugherty

Absent: Marge Moody - excused

Approval of minutes

Rae Daugherty made a motion accepting the minutes of March 6. 1997 with a correction. Elizabeth Ballew seconded it. All in favor "aye", none opposed.

Mary Church has a flyer showing the 75th Anniversary celebration for the Salem Indian Mission April 27th in Dorr, Mi. If interested get a copy of flyer.

John Wesaw, Jr. asked about having meetings at Elders Hall, when Rita is not there. Rusty Green stated we should call her to see if the Hall is available. She has Hall schedule. Elders Hall is in name only. Gerald stated we'll have Rita make up a schedule and post it at one of the offices where we can call 1-800 number to see if she's going to be there.

Joe Winchester's Delegate report was not available for membership at this time.

Gerald stated he brought back from the MIEA Conference literature about diabetics, substance abuse, bad weather, tornadoes. Brought back cards from several Doctors; he will pass them on to departments that can use them. Taped most of the meetings, and will give those tapes to departments to listen to what the Doctors had to say.

Joe stated Rita only lost by one vote for Chairperson. Gerald stated that it was one or two votes across the board. He thought our group made a real good showing; for being unknown.

Henry White stated it was his understanding that the Delegates and the Alternate voted. Only time an Alternate votes is in the absence of a Delegate. Membership agrees they understand that only two (2) Delegates will vote. If one of them can't make it, then the

Alternate can vote. All in favor say "aye". We're all in agreement.

Marchell Wesaw is here to see if there are any questions about the ordinance. Process was to ask Elders Council membership to vote on the Ordinance and then bring it back. It was sent to Tribal council to see if they had any major questions or concerns about what's in the Ordinance or what's not in the ordinance.
